SALE SWING BRIDGE

The Sale Swing Bridge has a long history, and is the oldest surviving swing bridge of its kind in Australia. It is regarded as one of the engineering wonders of Gippsland as has been classified by the National Trust.

Located at the junction of the Thompson and Latrobe Rivers, the Swing Bridge was built in 1883 by the Victorian Government, having been designed by John Grainger. It was the first movable bridge in Victoria, it measures 45 metres long and is constructed from wrought-iron that pivots on cylindrical steel columns. And as the name suggests, it was designed to swing open to allow shipping to and from the Port of Sale.

How to get there:

Follow the South Gippsland Highway south (towards Yarram), for approximately 5km, where you'll find the turn off to your right, signed Swing Bridge.

The scheduled opening times are:

- Every Saturday and Sunday, open at 3pm and closing at 4pm.
- Second Wednesday of the month, open at 11am and closing

(Note: the operating hours of the bridge can occasionally be affected by circumstances such as weather conditions and maintenance works).



Gippsland Art Gallery

Grand Canal Road Sale

Established in 1965, the Gippsland Art Gallery was the first public art venue open east of Melbourne. Today the Gippsland Art Gallery is the premier art destination in Gippsland. The Gallery is home to Gippsland's most comprehensive collection of art and hosts a diverse and dynamic range of exhibitions and visitor programs and is also home to a permanent display of pieces from textile artist, Annemieke Mein. There is also a great gift shop featuring local Gippsland artists and producers.

Gippsland Armed Forces Museum

A regional military museum, it researches, educates and exhibits art, film, heraldry, photographs, private records and technology to illustrate the role that Gippsland men and women have played in the defence of our country in times of war and peace since

Sale Historical Society

130 Foster Street Sale

The Sale Historical Society Museum located in the original borough of Sale offices showcases local history and life in Sale from its beginnings as "Flooding Creek". The museum has an impressive collection of early Sale artefacts and photographs that showcase Sale's historical past. The Sale Historical Society also manages operations of the Sale Powder Magazine and Sale Signal Box Museum.

Sale Water Tower Museum

Victoria Park - Cunninghame Street Sale

Built in 1888, the water tower supplied water to the town replacing carted water from the Thompson River. Designed and built by English born architect and civil engineer, John Harry Grainger, the 54ft high (16.5m) tower supports a 40,000 gallon (151,000 litre) wrought iron tank. The water tower is now a dedicated museum to the history of Sale and the development of the towns water system.

WALKS & RIDES IN SALE

Lake Guthridge Precint

Foster Street Sale (3.1km return)

Lakes Guthridge & Guyatt are located off Foster Street and can be accessed from either McIntosh Drive or from Guthridge Parade (walking through the Botanic Gardens). The Lake Guthridge Precinct offers a tranquil and picturesque setting in the heart of Sale and have long been a focal point for recreational activities, picnics, BBQs and nature observation. Other attractions include the Aboriginal Art Interpretative Trail, Seed Community Garden, Historic Powder Magazine, Heritage Botanic Gardens, Children's Playgrounds and Aboriginal Canoe Tree.

Sale Botanic Gardens

Guthridge Parade Sale

The Sale Botanic Gardens offers a great range of activities and walking paths for all abilities. The spectacular gardens feature grassed areas, paved walking paths, a playground, undercover picnic area, sculptures, sensory gardens, forests and much more to enjoy. Don't forget to visit The Garden for Life, which includes a water play space.

Take in a walk along one of the many paths, before sitting down to enjoy a bite to eat at one of the many picnic areas that can be found within the grounds.



Herb Guyatt Sanctuary

Princes Highway Wurruk (approx 1.1km return)

This sanctuary is named after Herb Guyatt, who was one of the first environmentalists in the Sale region. He advocated for the protection of local wetlands. The walk around this sanctuary is dominated by a Red Gum woodland, and is characterized by the large Forest Red Gums and River Red Gums. These endangered floodplain woodlands are important wildlife corridors for birds and animals to move through the agricultural landscape between the Gippsland Lakes and the mountains to the north.

WALKS & RIDES IN SALE

Port of Sale to Swing Bridge

Grand Canal Drive (10km return)

The Port of Sale to Swing Bridge walk allows visitors to take in the Thompson River from the banks of the Canal Reserve. Commencing at the Port of Sale, which boasts numerous amenities, the well manicured trail traverses parklands before ending at the historic Swing Bridge. The trail follows the Sale Canal to the Thompson River, which then flows into the Latrobe. Picnic tables and interpretative signage can be found along the trail, as well as seating for relaxation and observation.

Sale Heritage Walk

Foster Street Sale (3km return)

This walk is designed to begin at the Port of Sale, then head west - this walk takes in churches, courthouses, schools and other historic buildings throughout the town. The walk is a perfect way to get a taste of the history of Sale, including some wonderful architecture, country hospitality and friendly locals.



Sale Common Wetlands

South Gippsland Highway (approx 17km return) You can enjoy the internationally listed Sale Common Wetlands, hosting a combination of freshwater marshes and red gum woodlands with an enormous variety of bird life. Stroll along the extensive new boardwalk allowing you to get close and personal to this magnificent wetlands area. The extensive boardwalk winds its way through a variety of habitats, starting from the edge of the swamp, through deeper water, past islands and through a small reed bed. At the eastern end of the boardwalk, relax and watch the pelicans, swans and ducks from the bird hide.

SALE COMMON WETLANDS

The Sale Common Wetlands was originally proclaimed in 1863 and was used for farming up until 1964 when it became a nature conservation reserve. The wetlands area is listed as a RAMSAR site, meaning it is recognised for its international importance in the protection to the loss of wetlands. The Sale Common Wetlands include freshwater, marshes and red gum woodlands which support an extensive variety of birdlife along the 450 metres of boardwalks and bird hides, all of which makes it a perfect spot for avid bird watchers.

The unique history of Sale's Common Nature Conservation Reserve can be seen as you stroll along the many kilometres of tracks and boardwalks. The interpretative signage trail highlights the importance of this area to the GunaiKurnai People, including its uses to early settlers.

A River Heritage and Wetlands Trail directs walkers along the historic Sale Canal to the Sale Common Wetlands and from there you can continue to the historic Swing Bridge. The trail is marked with interpretative panels at heritage locations describing the local flora, fauna and maritime history of the port area for Sale and nearby Sale Wetlands.

Access to the River Heritage and Wetlands Trail is available from the Port of Sale, and access to the Sale Common Wetlands is available from the South Gippsland Highway.
