

Throw in a line for some of the region's best fresh and salt water fishing, or launch a boat at one of the many ramps along the foreshore. The 90 Mile Beach Surf Fishing Competition is one of Australia's largest Surf Fishing Comps and is held annually during late January, with another competition held at Easter to mark the end of summer.

Adjacent to the Gippsland Lakes Coastal Park, the 90 Mile Beach Marine National Park covers 5 kilometres of coastline. The beach lies on the edge of a long slender sand dune and the absence of rocky outcrops or headlands results in an endless vista of sand and sea. Beneath the water, vast plains of sand stretch in every direction and provide refuge for more species per square metre than most other marine habitats in the world. The park also has a rich indigenous history and is part of the country of the Gunaikurnai People.



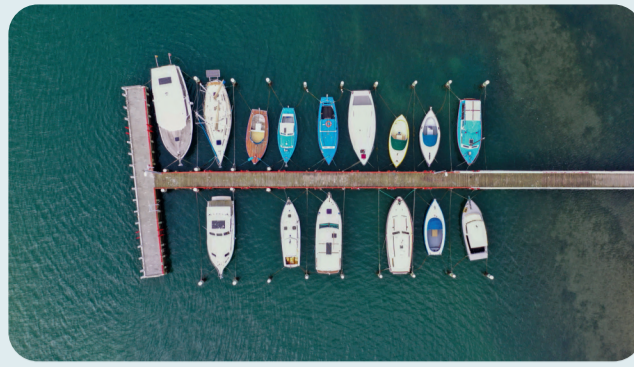
It's pristine golden sands separate the Gippsland Lakes from Bass Strait. The 90 Mile Beach sits at the edge of the Gippsland Lakes, the largest inland water system in the Southern Hemisphere. Swimming sections of the beach are patrolled over summer and caravan parks and camping grounds are available at spots along the beach.

One of the longest uninterrupted beaches in the world, the 90 Mile Beach is ideal for activities from surf fishing, swimming, walking, to whale and dolphin spotting, or just lazing in the sun. Comprised of sun, sand and lush national and marine coastal parks, all combine to create the perfect holiday environment.

With a reputation for recreational fishing, scenic boat tours and fresh seafood, Port Albert has also become a photographers dream, with calm waters creating the perfect backdrop to shoot. Artists, anglers, historians, walkers and anyone with an interest in anything maritime will relish in what Port Albert has to offer.



One in particular, the former Bank of Victoria building was transformed into the home of the Gippsland Regional Maritime Museum, which opens weekends and school holidays between June and August, or by appointment. The Museum, and nearby Port Albert Art Gallery both provide cultural places of interest for visitors to enjoy.

Port Albert is a picturesque fishing village situated at the southern end of the 90 Mile Beach. The Port nestles on the shores of the Nooramunga Marine and Wildlife Reserve and was the site of one of Victoria's first European settlements. Settled in 1841, Port Albert provided a gateway to Eastern Victoria.

Shipping arrived directly from overseas, bringing new settlers and thousands of tonnes of cargo for distribution throughout the new Gippsland region. Immigration barracks and bond stores were erected in Port Albert. Many of the Port's historic buildings still survive today.

BEAUTIFUL BEACHES

You will find a bounty of beautiful beaches stretching along the magnificent 90 Mile Beach, from Robertson's Beach through to Paradise and Lett's Beach. There are many wonderful stretches of golden sandy beaches to explore.

Robertson's Beach

Robertson's Beach is a peaceful seaside community with limited facilities, but is a haven for fishing and bird watching. Whether you enjoy boating or throwing in a line, Robertson's Beach has protected waters waiting just for you.

Mann's Beach

Mann's Beach is a small community based near Port Albert, with toilet facilities, a jetty and a boat ramp to launch your vessel from. The body of water through Mann's Beach runs offshore into Bass Strait.

McLoughlin's Beach

McLoughlin's Beach is a small seaside settlement with a number of holiday houses and facilities. McLoughlin's Beach has a boat ramp, jetty and many serene spots for you to enjoy a lazy sunny day by the water. With a quiet inlet and surf fishing spots, there are plenty of choices for you to explore.

Reeve's Beach

Reeve's Beach is the most southern section of the famous 90 Mile Beach, and can often be a great spot to see dolphins and whales in the distance. It is a perfect spot to enjoy the stunning waters of the 90 Mile Beach coastline.



LOCH SPORT

Positioned on the foreshore of Lake Victoria between the Gippsland Lakes Coastal Park and Lakes National Park, Loch Sport is a hidden gem, and natural mecca for all things water sports including water skiing, sailing, kayaking, swimming, fishing and boating.

If relaxing is more your style or if you find yourself hungry and thirsty at the end of a busy day, eateries throughout the town will surely satisfy!

There's a community playground complete with skateboard ramp and quarter court basketball court to discover.

The Lakes National Park is a living treasure for flora and fauna, with an array of native wildlife, including kangaroos, emus, echidnas, koalas and brilliant birdlife, along with a plethora of wildflowers.

Burrnan Dolphins are often spotted in the lake.

THINGS TO DO:

- Sit out on the deck at the Lakeview Bar & Bistro and watch the flurry of activity on the water.
- Watch the sunset over the lake, or walk on the beach.
- Fish off the jetty or on the surf beach.
- Visit Rotomah Island Bird Observatory.
- Picnic at Sperm Whale Head and watch for dolphins.
- Enjoy a round of golf.
- Explore the Loch Sport Art Trail along the foreshore.
- The local art community is showcased at the Post Office Gallery.

Accommodation can be found at Holiday Retreats, Holiday Rentals and Caravan Parks throughout the town.



GOLDEN/PARADISE BEACH

This quiet seaside town has a wonderful community playground for young children to enjoy when they aren't busy making sandcastles or playing on the beach.

Walking the golden sands of the 90 Mile Beach you can enjoy an abundance of shells, cuttlefish, unique soft corals and sponges all while watching sea birds swooping the waves.

The area is known as a haven for wildlife with kangaroos, emus, wombats, possums, koalas and echidnas regularly seen when walking the trails around the town.

There is a diverse range of accommodation choices including rental properties and camping along the foreshore. Conveniently located within walking distance of the beach and amenities, the 48hr rest stop at the rear of the community centre is a great spot for fully self-contained caravans and big rigs. Adjacent to the rest stop you will find a Community Nursery and Garden.

After a day at the beach, why not enjoy a round of golf or a game of lawn bowls at the VMMR Reserve, where the bistro serves meals over the summer period.

Just a short drive between Golden Beach and Seaspray, you'll come across the wreck of the Trinculo. The Trinculo wrecked offshore on 30th May 1879, and these days some of the hull can still be seen, depending on sand movements. Later in 1881, the Paddle Steamer 'Paynesville' also wrecked offshore.

*Note that due to tide shifts, different segments can be seen at different times.



SEASPRAY



Swimming, fishing and boating are available along this part of the coastline. Merrimen's Creek offers a swimming alternative as well as boating and fishing. Anglers can enjoy both surf and creek fishing all year round, with fish such as salmon, snapper, flathead, bream, whiting and shark caught.

The Seaspray Surf Life Saving Club, formed in 1955, and still patrols the beach during peak summer periods. The Clubhouse offers stunning views of the golden sands from the balcony.

Accommodation can be found with a number of cottages throughout the town and the Seaspray Caravan Park ideally situated behind the dunes.

Seaspray is an ideal place to relax and enjoy the quiet tranquility of the endless golden sand of the 90 Mile Beach.

Make sure you stop in at the General Store for some fantastic local produce.

WOODSIDE BEACH



Woodside Beach is the ideal location for a peaceful yet brooding long walk. Winds can be strong, so bring a jumper and your surf fishing gear.

After you pull up at the car park, take the short trail to the beach and brace yourself for a jaw dropping moment, Woodside Beach stretches forever in both directions.

The beach is accompanied by Woodside town that sits on the southern end of Ninety Mile Beach. It is a peaceful location, home to a caravan park, surf club and an awesome playground.

The Woodside Beach Surf Life Saving Club patrols the beach during peak periods over the summer months and Woodside Beach also has a caravan park for those wanting to stay by the beach.
