



Gippsland Vehicle Collection - 1a Sale Road, Maffra Originally built during WW2 as a vegetable dehydrating plant

Maffra Medical Group - 150 Johnson Street, Maffra In 1923, Young's Arcade was built for owners Margaret and Henry Young. Young's Arcade was intended to be occupied by a variety of shops, however, its success was temporarily hampered by the Depression of the 1930s.

Sugar Beet Museum - McMahon Drive, Maffra
The former Beet Sugar Factory office (c1896) and weighbridge
were originally located on the site of
the Maffra Beet Sugar Factory near the railway station.

Maffco - 13-17 Railway Place, Maffra Originally the Maffra Co-operative (1918), known as Maffco. Maffra Co-operative joined Bairnsdale and Orbost in 1966 to become Gippsland Consolidated Milk Ltd. Now transformed to Maffco Brewery and Taphouse after recent renovations.

Maffra Railway Station - Railway Place, Maffra The railway line to Briagolong closed in 1952 and the line from Traralgon to Maffra closed in 1987.

Maffra Library - 150 Johnson Street, Maffra
Previously the Mechanics Institute built in 1886, 1892 (Mechanics Institute Hall), 1922 War Hall), 1925 (Soldiers' Memorial Hall)

Macalister Hotel - 2 Johnson Street, Maffra
The Iconic Macalister Hotel was rebuilt in part in 1922 following a
fire which destroyed most of the building. However, today there
are still areas in use which date back 150 years ago.

Metropolitan Hotel - 97 Johnson Street, Maffra Previously known as the Metropolitan, built in 1889-1890. The first hotel operated in Maffra from as early as 1870 on the same site. Now it has been redeveloped for Woolworths.

Maffra Hospital - 48 Kent Street, Maffra Built in 1946, the Maffra Hospital still provides services to the community to this day.

Catholic Church - Church Street, Maffra
A Foundation stone reads, "DOM This memorial stone of St Mary's
Church was blessed by the Most Reverend Patrick Phelan D.D. Bishop of
Sale May 4th 1924 - Rev P. Curran

Former Presbyterian Church - 7 Pearson Street, Maffra A Foundation stone reads, "Presbyterian Church This stone was laid by Mrs A. Morison 30th March 1904". The Church is now home to the St Andrew's Parish.

Former Methodist Church - 9 Pearson Street, Maffra A Foundation stone reads, "This stone was laid by The Rev Samuel Adamson President of the Conference 6th June 1912". The building is now the Maffra Senior Citizens Club".

St John's Anglican Church - 10-20 Church Street, Maffra A Foundation stone reads, "St John's Church The Foundation stone of the first church was laid by Mrs H. Gordon Glassford of Mewborn Park on September 1st 1871.

Maffra Courthouse - 96 Johnson Street, Maffra
Originally built in 1888, the Maffra Courthouse was a Court of
Petty Sessions/Magistrates Courts to 1983. It now houses the Pino
Deriu Gem and Mineral Collection along with the Maffra Visitor
Centre.

Former National Bank - 64 Johnson Street, Maffra The National Bank of Australasia opened its first branch in Maffra in December 1872. The National Bank is a well proportioned and simply detailed classical style bank building, and typical of bank architecture in Victorian country towns of the 1870s.

Foster's Buildings - 69-71 Johnson Street, Maffra The Foster's Building was built in 1908 for prominent local landowner Askin 'Alf' Foster. Described at the time as 'the most upto-date building in Gippsland', the Foster Building originally had shops at each end with residences above

Memorial Hall - Foster Street, Maffra
A hall commemorates those who have served in the various conflicts. This building replaced the original World War One Soldiers Memorial Hall which is now used as the Maffra Library.

Maffra Showgrounds - Edward Street, Maffra Agricultural Pastoral and Horticultural Society's showgrounds (1888) has undergone redevelopment and is now used by sporting groups and hosts the annual Maffra Show.

Duart Homestead - 20 McLean Street, Maffra Built-in 1883 as the Maffra home of Hon Allan McLean, a local who became Premier of Victoria in 1899 and in 1901. The home was named after Duart Castle in Scotland, the seat of the Clan McLean.
