CRITERION HOTEL

99 Macalister Street
In 1865, tenders were taken
to build a large hotel in Sale,
which saw the Criterion Hotel
take shape. Additions have
included the veranda in 1878
and more recently the Hotel
has undergone a major
rejuvenation turning the
building into a boutique bar,
restaurant and
accommodation venue.



SALE HISTORICAL SOCIETY



130 Foster Street
Believed to be the oldest
municipal building in
Gippsland, the original section
was the first council
chambers built in 1864 when
the Borough of Sale was
established. Council vacated
the property in 1960.

COLONIAL CLUB HOTEL

101-105 Foster Street
Built in 1858 by Richard
Bennison, the Club Hotel
was a hub for squatters. A
visit by the Prince of Wales
is commemorated by a
plaque in the hotel. Seriously
damaged by fire in the late
1900s the hotel was later
restored in the 1980s.



MONUMENTS

York & Foster Streets and McIntosh Drive Monuments dedicated to settlers and explorers of Sale and Gippsland can be found throughout the town.



PORT OF SALE

100 Foster Street
The Port of Sale Wellington Centre began its
life when built by ESSO
back in the 1970s as its
Gippsland headquarters.



ST MARY'S CATHEDRAL



47 - 57 Foster Street
The present church was
built on the site of an earlier
chapel. Work commenced
on the church in 1886 by
local builder George Wynd.
In 1887, Sale became a
diocese with James Corbett
the founding Bishop.

ST PATRICKS COLLEGE

29 - 41 Pearson Street
St Patricks College was
constructed in 1921 and
has recently undergone
some redevelopment to the
buildings. The school was
opened by the Marist
Brothers and later
amalgamated with Our
Lady of Sion in 1977.



SALE COURTHOUSE



79-87 Foster Street
The first part of the
Courthouse complex was
commenced in 1863 as the
Magistrate's Court. In 1889
a larger courthouse, the
Supreme Court was
constructed.

SULLIVAN BRAHAM LTD

104 Raymond Street
This imposing headquarters
was built by the Bank of
Australiasia in 1875, the scale
is reflecting the banks
confidence in Sale as a
regional centre.



AMP BUILDING



118-124 Raymond Street Erected in 1930 to replace an earlier 1919 building. The Australian Mutual Provident building was described as the 'most notable addition to the architecture of the town'.

ALLMAN MORONEY

121 Raymond Street
This impressive classical
building was originally the
Commonwealth Bank, built in
1889 and is a further
demonstration to the
economic strength of Sale by
the late 1880s.



COBB & CO STABLES



199 Raymond Street
The Stables, a large timber
building was originally built in
1878, that same year they
were occupied by Robertson,
Wagner & Co, who traded as
Cobb & Co Stables.

CLOCKTOWER

Pedestrian Mall





CENTRE BAKERY

103 Cunninghame Street
Built for the Methodist
congregatation in Sale in
1965, this former Methodist
Sunday School has been
converted into a modern
bakery.



ST PAULS CATHEDRAL



149 Cunninghame Street
St Paul's Cathedral was
built by a local builder in
1883-84 to replace the
first St Paul's. It became a
cathedral following the
creation of the Anglican
Diocese in 1902 with Dr
A.W. Pain as Bishop.

VICTORIA PARK

Cnr Marley & Cunninghame Streets

A large brick water tower (now a museum) was constructed in 1887 and a smaller concrete tower in 1922. The bandstand was built in 1913 to celebrate the Jubilee of Sale. It was dismantled in 1976 and reconstructed in 1980-83.



SALE PRIMARY SCHOOL



123-135 Macalister Street
Sale State School was built
in 1882-83 to replace the
Common School in
Raymond Street, part of
which still remains. The
school reflects Venetian
Gothic influences with its
wall patterns and window
arches.
