ABOUT DARGO

Located in the foothills of the Dargo High Plains is one of Victoria's most remote communities, which originally served as a supply town to the Crooked River Goldfields at Grant and Talbotville.

Four Wheel Driving, Canoeing, Fishing, Horse Riding, Walking and Gold Panning are all popular activities in and around the Dargo township.

Dargo is also known for its century old walnut groves that line the valley floor. Fuel, supplies and camping and accommodation options are all available within the township.



ALPINE NATIONAL PARK

In this south-western section of the park you will find pleasant Snow Gum woodlands, sprawling mountain vistas, spectacular rivers and gorges, as well as rich cultural heritage - from the rock scatters of the Gunai-Kurnai people on lofty vantage points, to graziers huts nestling in protected folds of the high country.

The main access is from Licola, via the Tamboritha Road, which lead to the Howitt and Moroka Roads. Mountain Roads are often unsealed, narrow and winding. Take care as may be slippery and surface conditions poor. Away from the main Howitt and Moroka Roads, many tracks are suitable only for experienced four wheel drivers, with many closed seasonally between Early June and Late October or longer. It is advised to check with Parks Victoria and VicRoads which tracks and trails are open.

GRANT HISTORIC AREA

17km - 30 mins from Dargo A short drive north of Dargo along the Dargo High Plains Road will bring you to



McMillan Road, and the Grant Historic Area. This thickly forested area hides many features of the mining days including cemeteries, township sites and mining relics. Despite its promise, the Crooked River field quickly waned. By the late 1880s, most settlements were deserted.

- Dargo High Plains Road


Use of HEMA or similar maps are recommended as internet and mobile reception is not always present in these remote areas.

DEN OF NARGUN

Mitchell River National Park 5km return walk - Grade 3 The Den of Nargun is a place of great cultural significance



to the Gunai-Kurnai, especially the women. Traditionally, Gunai-Kurnai men were not allowed down to the Den of Nargun or the Woolshed Creek Valley. Please treat this place with respect. Stories were told around campfires about how the Nargun would abduct children who wandered off on their own. The Nargun could not be harmed with boomerang or spears. These stories served the dual purpose of keeping children close to the camps and ensuring that people stayed away from the sacred cave.



HIGH COUNTRY HUTS

There are many old huts in the Alpine areas, some of them historical. Around Dargo the closest huts are

Collins, Wallers and Moroka. Enjoy visiting the huts, but please do not use them for overnight accommodation, as their cultural values can be destroyed, they can be used for emergency refuge only.
